

Competition Rules

- 1 Introduction & This document provides guidance and rules for running competitions and holding a handicap Application at Pyecombe Golf Club ('PGC'). It applies to all competitions and handicaps; irrespective of the type of competition or the Section under which the competition is being played. It is hoped that this universal application creates consistency across the board.
- The 'Golf Committee' 2 The Captain's Committee delegates responsibility for application of this document to the following (known as the 'Golf Committee'):
 - (a) Head of Golf
 - (b) Club Captain
 - (c) Head Professional
 - (d) Managing Secretary

The Golf Committee will endeavour to make decisions that are both fair to the player concerned and also to ensure fairness to all competitors.

Where there is no clear precedent in the "Decisions on the Rules of Golf", guidance will be sought from other appropriate sources.

Where possible the Golf Committee will make collective decisions, with the Head of Golf having the casting vote in the event of a tie. However, there will be circumstances where a collective decision cannot be made and with that in mind, any of the above ((a)-(d)) can make a decision on the Competition Rules on an individual basis.

Decisions which relate to the Rules of Golf or to handicapping infringements fall within the England Golf Disciplinary Framework and are subject to a right of appeal as set out below:

Rules All Competitions are played in accordance with the Rules of Golf as set out by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews. Where there is any conflict between those rules and this document, the Rules of Golf take precedence.

> Local Rules are adopted by the Club and are subject to change from time to time. They are displayed on the sign next to the first tee and also on the Club's website and should always be checked before play commences.

Unless otherwise directed by the Golf Committee:

- All competitors will commence play from the first tee.
- Men's competitions are played from the white tees.
- Seniors' competitions are played from the yellow tees (with the exception of the SCGU Cyril Blake / Gilbert print knockout and SLOGG, which are played from the white tees).

		 Ladies' competitions are played from the red tees. Mixed competitions (i.e. Club Salvers, Lynn Goblets are played from the reds and whites. Players will tee off at the time indicated on the draw sheet / online tee booking system.
5	Drawn stroke play competitions (medal / stableford etc)	 A poster will be displayed in both the clubhouse and Professional's shop. The entry sheet will be available in the Professional's shop. Each competitor should enter their name on the entry sheet. The draw will be made by the Managing Secretary and posted on BRS, on the date notified on the entry sheet. Any adjustments to the draw must be made through the Professional's shop. Once the maximum number of players has been reached / the draw has been made, the Managing Secretary will hold a reserves list, which will be addressed on a 'first come, first served' basis where players withdraw. Competitors that persistently withdraw or fail to turn up for competitions may be prevented from entering future competitions. On the day, competitors are required to report to the pro shop and pay their entry fee.
6	Drawn Knock Out competitions	 A poster will be displayed in both the clubhouse and Professional's shop. An entry sheet will be available in the Professional's shop. Each competitor should enter their name on the entry sheet. The entry fee is payable at this stage. Until the entry fee has been settled, the player has not entered the competition. The draw will be made by the Head Professional on the date notified on the entry sheet. A copy of the draw will then be posted on the Club's website. Any adjustments to the draw must be made through the Professional's shop. Where the draw has taken place for a pairs knockout, but it then transpires that a competitor cannot participate, that competitor can withdraw and be replaced by another competitor before their first match. Once the first match has taken place, no changes can be made.
7	Competitions entered 'on the day'	 The majority of our competitions are run in this way. Competitors will book their tee time in the usual way. On the day, the competitor will report to the Professional's shop, to express their intention to play in the competition. The entry will be recorded in the competitions book and the entry fee will be settled. Until the entry fee has been settled, the player has not entered the competition.
8	General play cards (previously known as supplementary scorecards)	 On the day, the player must report to the Professional's shop, to express their intention to submit a general play card. The entry will be recorded in the competitions book and the player can then proceed to the first tee. After the completion of a competition round, the player must submit their scorecard to the Professional's shop as soon as possible. All General play cards must be played: In accordance with The Rules of Golf In an authorised format of play
9	Competition eligibility	 Over a minimum number of 10 holes Standard competitions (such as weekly stablefords) can only be entered by competitors that have: A playing rights membership at PGC and A bona fide handicap. All board / trophy competitions can only be entered by members that have: A playing rights membership at PGC A playing rights membership at PGC A bona fide handicap and

- Submitted at least five competitive PGC scores, over 18 holes, within the preceding twelve months

For <u>'new joiners' that have been a member of another Club before joining PGC</u>, eligibility criteria is as follows:

- A playing rights membership at PGC
- A bona fide handicap and
- Submitted at least five competitive scores, over 18 holes, either at the member's previous Club or at PGC, within the preceding twelve months

For <u>'new joiners' that come to PGC with no handicap or an i-golf handicap</u>, eligibility criteria is as follows:

- A playing rights membership at PGC
- A bona fide handicap and
- Submitted at least five 18-hole PGC scores within the preceding twelve months:
- a. i-golfers
- At least two of these scores must be competitive rounds. The remainder can be general play or competitive scores.
- No previous handicap Three of these scores will be general play and the remaining two must be competitive scores.

It should be noted that competitions run for specific sections of the Club or with handicap restrictions cannot be entered by players that are not a member of the section or do not meet the handicap restriction.

For the avoidance of doubt, Independent Golfers with a handicap through England Golf are not permitted to participate in any of PGC's competitions.

10 Entry feesWith the exception of discontinuance of play, as set out below, entry fees are not refundable.
For example, it is the responsibility of each competitor to:

- Observe weather forecasts and make their own decision as to whether competitive play is viable.
- Ensure that they have sufficient time to complete their round before darkness.
- 11 **Onesie** A separate set of rules applies to the Onesie. See appendix 1 below.
- 12 **Scorecards returned by** All scorecards must be verified by a marker. As such, scorecards returned by single players will not be accepted for competitive or handicapping purposes.
- 13 Pace of PlayPlayers are required to maintain a good pace of play. They must keep up with the group in
front and failing this, allow other groups to play through as soon as it is safe to do so.
- 14 **Suspension of Play** Competitors may discontinue play due to dangerous conditions, as set out in the Rules of Golf.

Where competitors have entered post midday and are unable to complete their round by 7pm, the competition will be declared null and void and all entry fees will be refunded and the competition will be re-scheduled.

Any competition which is cancelled because of poor weather or where there are fewer than five competitors will be declared null and void and will not be re-played. In these circumstances competitors who had already played will be refunded their entry fee.

- 15 **Course Maintenance /** Competitors must accept the condition of the course as they find it and may not suspend play because of green keeping work being carried out during their round.
- 16 **Tied Competitions** Unless specified otherwise, to resolve any ties countback is used. Countback is worked out over the:
 - Last 9 holes,
 - Last 6 holes,

		 Last 3 holes, Last hole
		Handicaps will be applied proportionately. If this does not provide a clear winner the last 12 & 15 holes will be similarly used to decide.
		Where the competition is played over 15 holes the best score over the last 7, 6, 3 holes or last hole will be used to decide.
		Ties in the Club Championships (scratch) will be decided by a sudden death play-off, commencing from the 1 st tee and taking the holes in the usual sequence.
17	Handicaps	A member obtains a handicap by:
		 Presenting a handicap certificate from another Club or CDH / EG membership number or Submitting 3 scorecards (signed by another member) to the Professional's shop.
		Members with prior golfing experience are expected to inform the Club Secretary of this prior to being allocated a handicap.
		All players who begin play in any singles stroke play competition will be subject to handicap revision.
		The World Handicap System and Congu rules will be adhered to as regards adjustment of handicaps.
		The Golf Committee will carry out a review of handicaps in February each year.
		Handicap allowances will be consistent with those set out by the WHS / Congu.
18	Returning scorecards	All cards must be returned in accordance with the Rules of Golf. Cards must be handed in to the Professional's shop or, if the shop is closed, posted in the Competition Box.
19	Officials	The Professional's shop will be primarily responsible for access to the first tee and will is empowered to decide on any problems which may arise such as, starting times, provision of markers or handicaps.
20	Closing the Course	Closure of the course is addressed in a separate document which is available on the website.
21	Use of buggies	Use of buggies or similar vehicles is only permitted for competitive / general play rounds if:
		 Ground conditions allow and A medical certificate has been provided to the Managing Secretary / Professional. That medical certificate must state that the player is unable to play golf, without use of a buggy (or words to this effect).
22	Men's competitions	Entry / Sweepstake fees Entry fee – everyone must pay the entry fee stipulated
		Sweepstake – £3 Men's / Mixed individual competitions £6 Men's / Mixed pairs competitions

Team competitions vary

Sweepstake vouchers are awarded to the top 3 players in each division who have entered the sweepstake:

- Div 1: Playing Handicaps up to 13.
- Div 2: Handicaps 14 54

Small field rule - If the competition doesn't receive many entrants Small field rule will apply (1 division only)

Optional sweepstake – players' discretion. Only players who enter the sweepstake can win vouchers.

Results

Competitions are split into two divisions:

- Div 1: Playing Handicaps up to 13.
- Div 2: Handicaps 14 54

23 Women's competitions Entry / Sweepstake fees £3 Women's / Mixed individual competitions £6 Women's / Mixed pairs competitions Team competitions vary

Generally speaking, the above fees will all go towards sweepstake vouchers, as set out below. The exception is charity competitions; where the entire fee is paid over to the Lady Captain's Charity.

Sweepstake vouchers are awarded as follows:

- 1 to 5 players 1 division 1 prize 100%
- 6 to 10 players 1 division 2 prizes 60% / 40%
- 11 to 20 players 2 divisions 2 prizes per division 60% / 40%
- 21+ players 2 divisions 3 prizes per division 43.3% / 33.3% / 23.3%
- Div 1: Playing Handicaps up to 18.
- Div 2: Handicaps 19 54

- 1. The Onesie was introduced by past club captain, Gary Hann.
 - a. For qualifying competitions, the club's professional, Mike Ovett ('Mike') takes a fee of £1.00 per player.
 - b. When that fee is paid over to the shop, it is the player's responsibility to make the necessary entry into the competition book, by ticking under the column 'one'.
 - c. Any such fees are held by Mike in the Onesie pot ('the Pot').
 - d. The Pot grows incrementally, until such time as a player has a hole in one in a qualifying competition.
 - e. The player that has the hole in one takes the Pot, less 15% which is donated to PGC's Captain's Charity.
 - f. The Pot then starts again from a zero balance.
- 2. Entry into the Onesie is limited to male, adult members (or junior members accompanied by an adult member) participating in qualifying competitions. For these purposes, a qualifying competition is:
 - a. A singles game, and
 - b. Played from the white tees, and
 - c. One of PGC's competitions.
- 3. Once won, the Pot can:
 - a. Be used as credit in the pro shop.
 - b. Only be redeemed with Mike.
- 4. The Pot cannot be transferred:
 - a. Onto a member's club card.
 - b. To any other person.
 - c. To any other club professional.
 - d. Into a bank account or similar.
- 5. Where there are multiple hole in ones in the same competition (note the Men's Club Championship is played over two days), the Pot is split equally amongst all players achieving the same, irrespective of the timing of the hole in ones.
- 6. Where there are no hole in ones during one Captain's Year period, 50% of the Pot will be donated to PGC's Captain's Charity. The remaining 50% will 'roll over' and form the opening balance of the Pot for the new Captain's year.
- 7. Any challenge concerning the above rules shall be referred to the Captain's Committee, with that committee's decision on the matter being final.
